

### 2018 NLE NEW LATIN EDUCATORS SCHOLARSHIP WINNERS


The National Latin Exam is pleased to announce the winners of this year's \$2,000 scholarships. The NLE has designated one of these scholarships, given by an anonymous donor, as the Doris Kays Memorial Scholarship. Doris served for many years as Chair of the NLE Scholarship Committee. Our scholarship winners became eligible as high school seniors because they won gold medals on the 2018 NLE level III, IV, V, or VI exams. These scholars must take two semesters of Latin or ancient Greek language as college freshmen. They will be eligible to renew their scholarships each year if they continue their study of Latin or Greek. As juniors and seniors, they are required to have a declared major of Classics, Latin, or Greek. Below are the names of the winners, their high schools, Latin teachers, and the colleges or universities that they are attending.




## **Latin Teachers Can Administer Exam**


Salvete, omnes! The National Latin Exam Committee is pleased to announce that, beginning with the 2019 exams, Latin teachers will be allowed to be the primary and even sole administrator and supervisor when their students are taking the exam. We still encourage teachers to enlist the aid of other teachers and school personnel as proctors and assistants, particularly if you have a large number of students participating. Latin teachers will still be required to designate a principal, headmaster, or other school official who will receive the exam and keep it locked up until the time of the test. We are making this change after very many requests from teachers and administrators and much deliberation and discussion from members of the NLE Committee. # **National Latin Exam New Latin Educators Scholarship**



#### **Details:**

- Five \$2000 scholarships are given each spring.
- The application deadline is February 15th.
- Each scholarship is renewable for however long the recipient is a student enrolled in a bachelor's or master's degree program with the intention of teaching Latin at the K-12 level. The maximum funding is four years for a bachelor's degree and two years for a master's degree (exceptions at the discretion of the scholarship committee).
- •The NLE will cover the cost of attending one American Classical League Institute occurring from the end of their junior year in college through their third year of teaching. For more information on this conference see https://www.aclclassics.org/events.
- Recipients will be offered informal mentoring by experienced Latin teachers for the first three years of teaching.

#### **Applicants and recipients:**

- are not required to have taken the National Latin Exam
- may be a high school senior or undergraduate, or enrolled in a master's degree program
- must be planning to teach Latin at the K-12 levels
- may not apply for this scholarship if currently receiving another National Latin Exam award

## **DISCITUR LEGENDO**—THE NATIONAL LATIN EXAM READER

The National Latin Exam is proud to offer *Discitur Legendo: An NLE Latin Reader*, which contains every reading comprehension passage from 1978-2014 organized by level and in chronological order. In addition to containing 250 passages and questions, the book's table of contents provides detailed charts with the year, author, text, and passage title for each reading comprehension passage, making it easier for a teacher to find the passage's original source or search for a particular author or passage.

Sight reading is critical for improving reading skills. To that end, we hope that this book will prove to be a helpful resource for teachers and students across the country. The book is spiral bound to allow for ease of photocopying sight passages. Teachers are encouraged to adapt and add to the questions as they see fit. Students are encouraged to practice reading previously unseen passages to improve their comprehension of Latin. This book is a compilation of the efforts of those who have gone before, both ancient authors and recent exam writers, whose love of and care for the Latin language are evident in these passages and questions.

Discitur Legendo is available for purchase from the ACL's Teaching Materials & Resource Center (www.aclclassics.org/store). In addition, those who purchase the book will receive a complimentary pdf file of its contents, which is obviously not for redistribution or sale. The pdf files will allow teachers to project passages onto whiteboards. This book is a sine qua non for any teacher committed to instructing students through sight passages as well as for serious Latin students

N.B.: The TMRC also carries the Forum Romanum Companion Book.



# **National Latin Exam Offers Online Testing Option**

As you fill out your registration form for the 2019 NLE, you will notice that you have the choice to give the exam via the traditional paper and pencil method, or you can have your students take the exam online. The same protocols still apply whether the proctor is giving the test online or on paper. All students taking the same level of the exam must take the exam at the same time.

You are also being asked to give us specific numbers for how many students at level III are taking the Latin III-IV Prose exam and how many students at level IV are taking the Latin III-IV Prose exam. The same is true the Latin III-IV Poetry exam and the Latin V-VI exam. Specific log-in codes will be provided for your students based on what level exam they are taking. Please fill out your registration form completely to provide accurate information.

If you choose the online testing option, you will receive an access code on your confirmation postcard. Please make sure to put your postcard in a safe place. About a week before you are scheduled to give the exam, you will be able to use your access code to obtain student logins for each student participating at your school. The proctor is still in charge of overseeing the administration of the exam.

# ANDREW CARROLL, WINNER OF THE JANE HARRIMAN HALL PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT SCHOLARSHIP, TALKS ABOUT HIS EXPERIENCES



This past school year I was one of the recipients of a Jane Harriman Hall Professional Development Award. I used the award to help cover the costs of attending the Summer Institute of the American Classical League this past June in Missoula, Montana. I was particularly excited to see a Western city as host. Sometimes living in Colorado, it appears that all the interesting events tend to take place along the coasts.

At the ACL Summer Institute, I had the chance to present twice. The first presentation covered my year of teaching 3D modeling of artifacts to students and the challenges and successes of that type of program. The second one I was part of the Excellence Through Classics Committee group that spoke on how to use the National Mythology Exam to teach comparative mythology.

In between being on stage for my own presentations, I was able to see many other presenters share a lot of important information. I bounced from ImporTU Art, a fantastic National Junior Classical

League event that involves arts and crafts with a classical theme. It is an event for those students to share their passion of the Classics even if they are not academically inclined. I hope to bring this back to Colorado Junior Classical League. Another presentation I was able to attend was Simia See Simia Do, it was all about active Latin in the Elementary school level.

On the last day I saw an introduction to how to use the new Landmark Caesar book in the Advanced Placement class. With all the maps and secondary research done for this book, I cannot see an AP class happening without it. The book will help any teacher come up with interesting discussion questions or quiet the student who asks detailed military history questions that I never seem to have an answer for. The opening plenary with Aaron Brien of the Apsaalooke Nation speaking about his experience and the importance of stories was one that will stay with me for many years.

Beyond all the scheduled talks, Summer Institute is the best time I have had for reconnecting with far flung colleagues. I found myself running to many presentations because my conversation with a friend, both new and old, had run over. The ideas shared over a bagel and a cup of coffee are some of the most important ones that I take away from conferences.

ACL Summer Institute has bolstered my confidence to continue using spoken Latin in my classes and create more Comprehensible Input stories for my students, despite any errors I might make in their creation. I hope that more Latin teachers take advantage of this event in the future and that the National Latin Exam will continue to award the Jane Harriman Hall Professional Development Award to teachers, so they can join in such wonderful and stimulating conferences



# THE 2019 CHRISTINE FERNALD SLEEPER EDUCATIONAL TRAVEL AWARD ANNOUNCEMENT

#### **PURPOSE**

The Christine Fernald Sleeper Educational Travel Award is designed to support teachers of Latin by encouraging educational travel. The award was developed in honor of Christine Sleeper, one of the "Founding Mothers" of the National Latin Exam and life-long travel enthusiast, in order to offer Latin teachers the opportunity to expand horizons for themselves and their students. This award may be used to enroll in an established program abroad, such as the American Academy in Rome, a trip to a classical site such as those offered by the Vergilian Society, or an educational trip of one's own design – something which Christine herself often advocated.

The recipients understand that they will share their travel experiences by means of a short article for the NLE newsletter and possible presentation at ACL (or regional or local meeting of classicists).

#### **ELIGIBILITY**

Applicants must be current full-time teachers of Latin with at least three years of experience at the middle school/ high school/ community college/ college level who offer the NLE to their students. If you are currently receiving another scholarship from the National Latin Exam, you are not eligible to apply for this award.

#### **FUNDING**

The applicant will present a proposal and a budget for expenditures at the time of application, up to the award limit of \$5,000.

#### **NUMBER OF AWARDS**

There will be one award granted for the period of March 2019 through February 2020. Applicants are eligible for the award only once every ten years.

# APPLY FOR THE JANE HARRIMAN HALL PROFFESIONAL DEVELOPMENT SCHOLARSHIP!

#### **PURPOSE**

The Jane Harriman Hall Professional Development Scholarship is designed to support teachers in their ability to teach Latin. The scholarship was developed in honor of Jane Harriman Hall, founder of the National Latin Exam, in order to continue her efforts to bring high quality Latin instruction to students throughout the United States.

#### **ELIGIBILITY**

Applicants must be current teachers of Latin at the pre-K—12 level in a public or private school who spend at least 50% of their instructional time with students. Applicants are eligible for the award only once every ten years. If you are currently receiving another scholarship from the National Latin Exam, you are not eligible to apply for this award.

#### **FUNDING**

Scholarships will be awarded based on the impact they will have on students and effective use of the funds. A total of \$5,000 will be allocated to the scholarship annually. This may result in one or more awards being given, based on the number and quality of the proposals.

#### **TERM OF THE AWARD**

This annual scholarship may be used any time from March 2019 through February 2020.

# KATHLEEN DURKIN, WINNER OF THE JANE HARRIMAN HALL PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT SCHOLARSHIP, TALKS ABOUT HER EXPERIENCE



Thanks to the sponsorship of the Jane Harriman Hall Scholarship, I was able to travel to Sicily this summer for a 10-day program called Inter Versiculos in Sicilia. The program, run through the University of Michigan, focuses on Latin verse composition. I've always taught students about meters and how to scan lines of poetry, but I felt as if I lacked a sufficient understanding of why and how meter worked in the composition stage, or about poetic choice in the process. I wanted to better my own understanding of the mechanics of Latin poetry and

meter in order to help my students understand the beauty and labor of the poetry we read.

The 23 participants hailed from all over the US and UK, ranging from teenage undergraduates to octogenarians, all with varying backgrounds in Latin, poetry, and pedagogy. What I anticipated being a singular composition experience quickly became a workshop as we all had something different to offer. We received lectures on the specifics of composition and read authentic texts in each of the meters presented. When we set off to compose for the first time, dictionaries flooded the tables as we grappled with spare syllables, weak caesuras, quantities we swore were long (but alas, short!), and lines that just didn't work. Comrades became friends as we sought advice from one another on how to make sure our lines worked both in meter and in meaning.

In order to provide inspiration, our tireless program coordinators Paul Gwynne, Karla Herndon, and Gina Soter planned excursions to places near our already beautiful homestead of Fontanasalsa (a working olive farm near Trapani). We toured the historic town of Erice, visited a Carthaginian ship in Marsala, sailed around the island of Mozia, and explored the incredible temple and theater complex at Segesta. At the end of our ten days, in addition to some hexameters and an elegiac couplet, I'd written two haikus and an epigram directly related to our site visits.

I am proud of all that I accomplished at *Inter Versiculos* and feel I am a better Latinist, student and teacher, as a result. As I start this school year, I will keep the process and form in mind, and I know that I have a new appreciation for the art of writing and teaching Latin poetry. Thank you to the NLE for allowing me to participate in such an educative opportunity!

# LILAH TERWILLIGER KATZ, WINNER OF THE JANE HARRIMAN HALL PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT SCHOLARSHIP, TALKS ABOUT HER EXPERIENCE

Over the summer I used the funds awarded to me by the National Latin Exam from the Jane Harriman Hall Professional Development Scholarship to participate in a weeklong workshop on the Advanced Placement Latin exam. I chose to attend the AP Latin session moderated by Jill Crooker at the AP Summer Institute hosted by St. Joseph's College in Standish, ME. This workshop ran for a week from July 15th to July 20th. As a teacher still relatively new to the AP Latin exam (this will be my third year teaching AP Latin), I had previously wanted to participate in a summer AP workshop after hearing about other teachers' positive experiences, and with the assistance of the Jane Harriman Hall Scholarship, I was able to attend this summer.

The AP Summer Institute was a wonderful experience for me and incredibly beneficial for my continued growth as a teacher. At the workshop, I was able to meet with other Latin teachers from across the country and hear about their different programs. Throughout the session, we shared various teaching methods and strategies on how best to prepare students for the exam. Our instructor, Jill Crooker, encouraged us to stay in touch and use each other as a support system, not only during the week we were at the workshop, but also during the school year, since many of us, as it is common, are the only Latin teacher at our school. In addition, over the course of the week, each individual teacher completed a unit project which she presented on the last day of the workshop. Each unit highlighted a specific number of lines from the AP course syllabus and contained a translation, a vocabulary list, different assessments and an analytical essay question for those lines. After the presentations, each of us placed our unit plan in a Google Drive folder, which we shared with everyone in the session. As we return to school this September, each teacher has nine other already-completed unit plans to utilize throughout the year.

I know that this experience at the AP Latin workshop will greatly enhance my teaching because it gave me an opportunity to speak with other teachers about my program and ask for advice and guidance as well as offering my own in return. I feel rejuvenated as I approach the first weeks of school, full of new ideas and strategies to inspire the next class of AP Latin students.

Amy Leonard has taught Latin in the Atlanta area since 2004, and is entering her tenth year at Grady High School where the program has grown in recent years to 400+ Latin students. In the summer of 2019 she will co-direct her sixth Vergilian Society study tour for teachers "The Italy of Vergil and Caesar" with her husband, Miami University classics professor Steven Tuck. # **DEAR NELLY**

#### Q: Dear Nelly,

I heard from another Latin teacher that the NLE is now allowing Latin teachers to proctor the exam. Is this true? ~Incredulous in Indianapolis

#### A: Dear Incredulous,

Yes, as we announced at the 2018 ACL Institute and in this newsletter, starting with the 2019 exam, Latin teachers will now be allowed to proctor the exam. Please note that you must have someone at the school other than a Latin teacher to receive and secure the exam materials and to hold onto the exams themselves until the release date given on the Instructions for Examiners sheet. The 2019 exam registration form includes lines for the name of the proctor (who can be a Latin teacher) and the name of the person who will receive the exam materials (who cannot be a Latin teacher). We hope that this change in our proctoring policy will streamline the process and make for a smooth proctoring experience.

#### Q: Dear Nelly,

I am thinking of having my students take both the Latin III/IV Prose exam and the Latin III/ IV Poetry exam in the spring. Since we are studying both Prose and Poetry in my level IV class, I thought it would be appropriate for my students to take both exams. Is this allowed? ~Mulling in Mohall

#### A: Dear Mulling,

Unfortunately, the scenario you proposed is not allowed. Students are only allowed to take one exam annually, so you will need to decide whether the Latin III-IV Prose or Latin III-IV Poetry exam is most appropriate for your level IV students. Our syllabus, available at www.nle.org, can assist you in the selection process.



#### Q: Dear Nelly,

Now that the Latin teacher is allowed to proctor the exam, can the exam be given during our normal class times, or must all students taking the same exam test at the same time as before?

#### A: Dear Excited,

Great question! Students may take the exam in their classrooms, but all students taking the same exam are still required to test at the same time.

#### Q: Dear Nelly,

Our school is considering the online exam. In the past we have always offered the paper and pencil exam. What technical requirements are needed to administer the online exam?

### THE NATIONAL LATIN EXAM CONSULTANTS

Every fall the Writing Committee sends drafts of the seven exams to the consultants who are current high school teachers, college professors, or former educators. These consultants are split into two groups, the first group receiving the exams in mid-September and the second group in mid-October. David Perry, our macron specialist, adds the macrons to all the Latin words on the exams. The consultants carefully critique the questions on each of the exams, offer suggestions for improvement, and return their comments to the Writing Committee within a week's time. Their ideas and contributions are invaluable in the process of preparing the exams for distribution to national and international Latin students.

## THE NATIONAL LATIN EXAM WRITING COMMITTEE

The individual members of the Writing Committee, all seasoned teachers with experience using a wide variety of textbooks and teaching methods, begin writing the exams each spring. By the middle of August the members, meeting together as a committee, begin the difficult task of reviewing each exam with respect to the level of difficulty, accuracy, and content. After numerous revisions, the exams are sent to the consultants for their in-depth critiques. Acting upon their suggestions, the committee makes further changes. After a final review, fine-tuning, and proofing, the exams are printed and sent to the schools.

It usually takes the committee twelve to fifteen sessions averaging three to four hours each to complete the work associated with the exams. In addition to the general working sessions, each committee member spends hours taking care of specific tasks such as answering correspondence, word processing, record keeping, publicizing the exam, and writing newsletter articles.

# THE NATIONAL LATIN EXAM SCHOLARSHIP COMMITTEE

The NLE Scholarship Committee is composed of six readers: three college professors and three high school teachers plus the Chair. Only two professors and two high school teachers serve as readers each year. The applications are read several times prior to the selection of the twenty-one scholarship winners and five alternates. The first screening is done by the Chair. A second screening is then done to determine which applications will be sent to the readers. Approximately ninety applications are sent to the readers for a third reading. Each reader selects his top thirty-five applications and returns these selections to the chair. At this time, the committee members' choices are collated, and the winners are chosen. The names of the scholars are announced at The American Classical League Institute late in June.
